when honking birds alerted him to the need to look up and to Mary Jane Seipler finding an **Eastern Phoebe** along a stream in Manor.

As this was such a mild winter some general comments are also in order for this season. Minus the 400 Common Mergansers at Beaver Run Reservoir for the December 31 Bushy Run CBC (seen by several parties and counted by Rebecca Hart and Steve Manns) and 100 Ring-necked Ducks at Donegal Lake (reported by Eric Hall) there was very modest reporting and low species counts for waterfowl this season. While it is not all that unusual for no reports of Scoters and Canvasback, having no reports for American Coot is unprecedented in my memory and who can explain MJ finding an Eastern Phoebe on January 1? The warm weather provided for more sightings and numbers of Turkey Vultures and American Kestrels, not just in Westmoreland County but also in the state-wide Winter Raptor Survey results. Without a substantial and sustained freeze, the congregation of Bald Eagles at Loyalhanna Dam was a bit underwhelming compared to recent winters – never more than the six that Mark McConaughy counted there on December 8. In addition to warm weather impacts perhaps some evidence that the winter fruits might have been in short supply as Cedar Waxwings, Hermit Thrush, Eastern Towhees and Yellow-rumped Warblers were few and far between this winter. And to close, a reminder that for my full narrative on the season, along with all other Pennsylvania Counties, and other articles and photo highlights from across the Commonwealth are included in the PA Birds Journal which comes with membership in the Pennsylvania Society for Ornithology.
